

## Frank B. Shepherd

Funeral services were conducted Aug. 30 in Abilene, Texas for Frank B. Shepherd, 88, long-time gospel preacher and writer. He passed away Aug. 28 in a Fort Worth hospital.

Brother Shepherd was born in London, England, in 1885. He moved to Canada in 1905 and lived there until 12 at which time he moved to Tennessee. The following year he moved to Texas. In 1923 he was the preacher for the College Church of Christ on the campus of Abilene Christian College. When the school moved to the new campus in 1929, Brother Shepherd was one of the charter members and the first preacher for the Highland congregation.

Brother Shepherd later preached for the church in Sweetwater and for other congregations in Texas. During his active ministry he had preached in every state in the union except Alaska.

Survivors include his wife, Annie; three sons, Paul of Houston, Maurice of Burleson, Neal of Lynchburg, Va.; one daughter, Mrs. J. Marshall Butz of San Antonio; a sister, Mrs. Alan Pendred of London, England; ten grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.
