Mary Williams Trout Diary, 1899

JAY. — The death of John C. Jay occurred in Meaford, Ontario, on Sunday evening, November 21, 1937. He had been in declining health for some time. Brother Jay was the son of the late Charles H. Jay, and

was born in Meaford sixty-two years ago. For more than forty years he served the Meaford public in the hardware business, and was also a member of the public schools and cemetery boards. His genial disposition and kindly manner endeared him to everybody. He was probably the most widely-known personage behind the counter in this, Georgian Bay town. People from all walks of life, mourned his departure, and many freely expressed their sorrow in words and tears. All business practically ceased on the main street during the funeral, and many stood outside the house in the shivering cold, - unable to find admittance during the service. Some thirty-seven years ago he spent one winter in the old Nashville Bible School. Time and again have I heard him mention the names of David Lipscomb and James A. Harding, at whose feet he was taught the word of God. In 1901 he was married to Miss Emma Godfrey, who survives. Also surviving are two sons and one daughter: Harvey, of St. Thomas; Bruce, who is on the teaching staff of the public schools; and Mrs. Daniel White, of Meaford. He leaves a brother; Hugh Jay, of Toronto, and a sister, Miss Helen Jay, of Meaford. During my three years of service with the Meaford Church he was a close friend and counselor, and rendered valuable service as the song leader. The funeral was conducted by the writer, assisted by Brethren Stewart and McCully, after which the body was taken to the beautiful Lakeview Cemetery, overlooking Georgian Bav.—C. McPHEE.

JAY.—John C. Jay, Meaford, Ontario, son of the late Charles H. Jay, passed away Sunday, November 19, 1937. He was about sixty-two years old. "Jack," as his intimate friends called him, was an exceptionally fine type. I knew him for about twenty years. I never saw him lose his temper, nor did I

ever hear him tell a smutty joke or bitterly attack any one. Brother Jay was a member of the church from his youth; a sweet singer, always at his place as song leader of the congregation until recent years, when, on account of failing health, his son, Bruce, took his place. In business Brother Jay was connected with the Butchart Hardware Company for thirty-five years. This firm discontinued when William Butchart passed away a few years ago, and on account of this Jack lost heavily; but he only said:

"Oh, well, everything will be all right." In a little while he entered the partnership of Walker-Jay, where he continued until forced by ill-health to retire. He was a Christian in business. Jack was one of the first students of the old Nashville Bible School on Spruce Street. His home was ideal. In the year 1917, I visited Meaford the first time. My home was with Jack Jay. In 1918-1919 my home was with Mrs. C. H. Jay, Jack's mother. For about three years I was in and out of the homes of the Jays. On my last trip to Canada, 1935, we stayed in Jack's home for almost two months. Jack was always the same smiling, laughing, singing, whistling, pleasant talking soul. Brother Jay leaves a wife, two sons (Harvey and Bruce), one daughter (Mrs. Arley White), one brother (Hugh), one sister (Helen), also a host of friends to mourn his passing. C. G.
