Attended the Nashville Bible School during the 1898-99. Listed as from Carman, Manitoba.

and the first Canadian location to have an established Bible School

Among the late arrivals at the Nashville Bible School from Meaford, Canada, are Mr. and Mrs. John Deegan, Mr. and Mrs. James Trout, Miss Maud York, Miss Emily Falls, W. F. Cox, and John Jay. W. E. Trout, who is in charge of the Commercial Department of the Bible School, came with his wife and child the last of September. From the city of St. Catharines we have Brother Ellis Claus, and from Carman, Manitoba, we have Brothers Stanley York and Norman Mallory. With Brother Whitfield, who has been here two terms, and Brother Mackie, we make up a fair representation from that part of the continent.

up my diary Stanley and Norman Mallory came from Carman tonight

I had a chat with Stanley after dinner then with Cox & Claus after - York is gong to room with them

SUN. JAN. 1, 1899

We had some snow this morning thawed a little in middle of day Bro spoke this Lipscomb morning on 53 Isaiah The Vicarious suffering of Jesus. He was grand I wrote letters to Mrs Hamley and Mrs Whitelaw. Had the boys down for a treat of candy nuts & raisins They were Bro Claus, Cox, York, Jackson and Sam Whitfield and Wilson Mallory were here had a sing

FRIDAY 6 [JAN 1899]

We baked pumpkin pies the last of the season We had some fine speeches this Topic lesson from Mallory Whitfield S. M. Jones and Harding the latter was just fine Stanley said it was worth the fare down.

MONDAY [April] 24 [1899]

Stanley Jackson Mallory & Whitfield left at 7:20 this morning We washed took up carpet & shook it scrubbed all floors all stairs Jones did dining room. I packed tubs James down town. F. W. Smith came this evening preached just grand on We are workers together

Mary Williams Trout Diary, 1899

He was born while his father and brother John were working on the Stone House. He was known as Stanley.

Travelling west from Ontario in 1889, he settled at Carman MB for a time. It was from Carman that he travelled in 1898 to study at the Nashville (TN) Bible School. That was apparently not his only activity during that time for after reporting his return from Nashville in their 11 May issue, the *Dufferin (MB) Leader* reported on 27 Jul 1899:

Bates - H.A. Smiley carries a black eye and Stanley York a broken finger as a result of ball catching.

Stanley is remembered for his way with a violin and his share in social affairs. He continued to play his violin until the time of his death.

Continuing his travels west, he lived in Saskatchewan during the time of the Riel Rebellion. From here he continued on to Alberta. Other residences included High River AB, Nanton and Innisfail AB, where they raised horses and cattle, Medicine Hat and Lethbridge AB. They also lived in California, first at Hayward, where they raised chickens, and later at Turlock where they raised hay and fruit. --Shirley York Anderson

YORK

Stanley Fredrick York passed away March 25th, 1968 at the Lethbridge Hospital at the age of 91 years, 11 months and 11 days. His funeral was held at Lethbridge, March 29th. He was born in Meaford, Ontario, April 14, 1876. He came from Meaford to Carman, Manitoba in May, 1889 and in June, 1890, he went with his parents to Touchwood, Saskatchewan. He returned to Carman the following year or so to join John Mallory and two other Carman boys to attend Bible School in Nashville, Tennessee. He came back west and on May 27th, 1903, he married Ella E. Wallace at Calgary, Alberta. They lived at High River for a time, then moved to California for some years, then back to Lethbridge, Alberta where she passed away some years ago. (June 23, 1954).
